Welcome to Korea

You picked the right country. Korea is the rare place where a 600-year-old palace sits across the street from a glass tower, where dinner is a contact sport and dessert is an art form, and where the trains are so good you can wake up in Seoul and eat lunch by the sea in Busan.

This guide is built for your **first trip** — the one where you want to see the icons, eat the legendary food, and not waste a single day figuring out logistics. Everything here is sequenced so each day flows into the next, with realistic timings, honest costs, and the small local moves that separate a good trip from a great one.



How it's laid out

Four days unraveling Seoul, a bullet-train south, two days in Busan, and a relaxed exit. Each day has a Morning / Afternoon / Evening rhythm you can follow exactly — or remix.



Real numbers

Every day shows an estimated spend in Korean won (₩). Prices were checked for 2026, but rates and fares move — treat them as smart guardrails, not gospel.



Make it yours

Look for **Gazi's Tip** boxes — the stuff I'd actually tell a friend flying in. The last page shows how to drop your own photos into this guide.



BEFORE WE START

Save offline maps in **Naver Map** or **KakaoMap** before you fly. Google Maps does not give walking or transit directions in Korea — this single swap will save you on every single day of this trip.

*Exchange rates move constantly. Check a live rate the week you travel; almost everything in this guide is priced in won so you always know the real local cost.



Before You Go

Entry into Korea is genuinely easy right now — but two things changed for 2026. Get these sorted before you fly.



K-ETA — likely waived

Through **31 December 2026**, citizens of many visa-free countries (incl. the US, UK, Canada, Australia, Germany & more) can enter **without a K-ETA**. From 1 Jan 2027 it's expected to be required again, so check your nationality on the official K-ETA site close to your travel date.



e-Arrival Card — new

Korea went fully digital in 2026. If you don't hold a K-ETA, complete the free **e-Arrival Card** online within **3 days** before you land (e-arrivalcard.go.kr). Do it on the plane Wi-Fi if you forget — it takes 5 minutes.

The pre-flight checklist

- Passport valid for your whole stay
- Check K-ETA status for your nationality (or apply, ~₩10,000)
- Submit e-Arrival Card if not K-ETA-exempt
- Buy / install your eSIM (see Chapter 06)
- Download Naver Map, KakaoMap & Papago (translate)
- Pre-book your KTX seats & any DMZ tour



Good to know

Visa-free entry is typically for **short tourism stays** (length depends on nationality — often up to 90 days). You may be asked for proof of onward travel and accommodation. Rules change; the official source is **hikorea.go.kr** and your nearest Korean embassy.



GAZI'S TIP

Screenshot your K-ETA / e-Arrival confirmation and your first night's hotel booking. Immigration is fast and friendly, but having it offline and ready means you breeze through while everyone else digs through their inbox.

When to Visit

Korea has four sharply different seasons. Spring and autumn are the crowd-pleasers — here's the honest trade-off for each.



Spring

LATE MAR – MAY

Cherry blossoms, mild days, the country at its prettiest. Late March to early April is peak bloom. Book early — everyone wants this window.

Best looks



Summer

JUN – AUG

Hot, humid, and the rainy season (jangma) hits July. Festival energy, Han River nights, and cheaper shoulder deals if you can handle the heat.

Beach + budget



Autumn

SEP – NOV

The local favourite. Crisp air, golden foliage peaking late October to mid-November, and the best hiking and eating weather of the year.

Sweet spot



Winter

DEC – FEB

Cold and dry, occasional snow. Fewer tourists, glittering city lights, steaming street food, and ski country an hour from Seoul.

Quiet + cosy



GAZI'S TIP

If you can choose, aim for **mid-to-late October**. You get autumn colour, comfortable 15–22°C days, blue skies for photos, and thinner crowds than the spring blossom rush — without summer's humidity.



What to Pack

Korea is a modern, well-stocked country — you can buy almost anything here. Pack light and bring the few things that actually matter.

Essentials

- Round 2-pin (Type C/F) adapter
- Comfortable walking shoes — you'll easily hit 15–20k steps/day
- A slim daypack for day trips
- Card + some cash backup
- Reusable water bottle

Smart adds

- Foldable tote for shopping hauls
- Portable charger
- Hand sanitiser & a few tissues (some restrooms lack both)
- Slip-on shoes (you'll remove them at some venues)
- Any prescription meds in original packaging

By season

- Spring/Autumn: layers + a light jacket
- Summer: breathable clothes, umbrella, sunscreen
- Winter: a proper warm coat, gloves, lip balm
- Year-round: a mask is handy on busy days



Leave it at home

Skip bulky toiletries and skincare — Korea **is** skincare. Olive Young on every corner sells everything cheaper and better. Travel with empties and stock up on day one.



GAZI'S TIP

Pack a half-empty suitcase. Between skincare, fashion, snacks and souvenirs, first-timers consistently underestimate how much they'll buy. Your future self lugging a bursting bag through Incheon will thank you.

Money, Cards & Budgeting

Korea is mostly cashless, but a little cash still smooths the edges. Here's the setup that just works.



Pay with

Cards (incl. contactless) work nearly everywhere — malls, cafés, taxis, convenience stores. Carry **₩50–100k cash** for traditional markets, small street-food stalls and the odd machine that rejects foreign cards.



Get cash

Withdraw won from **ATMs marked "Global"** (in convenience stores, banks, the airport). Notify your bank before you fly. A multi-currency card (Wise, Revolut) usually beats airport exchange counters.



WOWPASS

A traveller card that combines currency exchange + a T-money transit card in one. Load foreign cash, pay or ride. Handy if you want a single tap-for-everything card from the airport.

Staying Connected

You'll want data from the second you land — for maps, translation, taxis and KTX bookings. Three ways to do it.



eSIM

Easiest

If your phone supports eSIM, this is the move. Buy online **before you fly**, scan a QR code, and you have data the moment you land — no shop queues, no swapping out your home SIM.

Grab a Korea eSIM via Klook — quick activation and traveller-friendly data plans.



Physical SIM

Pick one up at an Incheon Airport counter on arrival. Reliable and great if your phone is older or eSIM-incompatible, but you'll spend 10–15 minutes at the desk and store your home SIM.



Pocket Wi-Fi

A rental hotspot for the group — good value if 2+ people share one device. The trade-off: one more gadget to charge and carry, and everyone has to stay together.



GAZI'S TIP

Whatever you choose, **set it up before departure** and test it. The number-one first-day stumble is landing with no data and no way to call a taxi or open a map. An eSIM you activated at home removes that risk entirely.

Apps to install now

Naver Map & KakaoMap (navigation — Google Maps won't route you here) · **Papago** (translation, better than Google for Korean) · **KakaoTaxi** (ride-hailing) · **KorailTalk** (KTX tickets) · **Subway Korea** (offline metro maps).

Getting Around Seoul

Seoul's subway is clean, cheap, signed in English, and goes everywhere. Master one card and the whole city opens up.



The T-money card

Buy a rechargeable **T-money** card at any convenience store (GS25, CU, 7-Eleven) for ₩2,500–4,000, then load it with cash. Tap in *and* out on subways. One card covers subway, bus, most taxis, and even works in Busan, Jeju and beyond.

- Base subway fare: ₩1,550 per ride (distance-based after ~10km)
- Saves ₩100/ride vs single tickets + free transfers within 30 min
- Top up at station kiosks (cash) or convenience-store counters
- Refund leftover balance (minus ₩500) at the airport before you fly



From the airport

AREX train from Incheon (ICN): the all-stop runs ~₩4,750 to Seoul Station; the Express is faster (~43 min) for more. Airport **limousine buses** drop near major hotels. Grab your T-money *and* some cash before you leave arrivals.



Climate Card

Staying put in Seoul and riding a lot? The unlimited **Climate Card** (e.g. ~₩15,000 for a few days of Seoul subway + bus) pays for itself fast — break-even is roughly ten rides.



Taxis & walking

Taxis are affordable and metered — use **KakaoTaxi** to avoid language friction. Most neighbourhoods (Myeongdong, Hongdae, Insadong) are best explored on foot once you arrive by subway.



GAZI'S TIP

Mastercard holders can now load T-money straight from **Apple Wallet** or the Korea Tour Card app and tap with just your phone — no physical card needed. Visa users: grab the plastic card, it's foolproof.

The KTX to Busan

Korea's bullet train is the highlight nobody expects. Downtown Seoul to the southern coast in well under three hours.

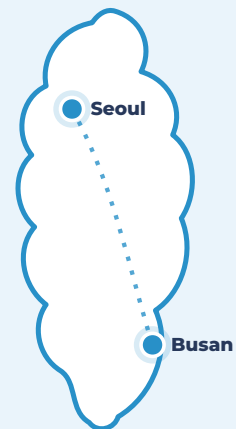

How to ride it

- Departs **Seoul Station** (Gyeongbu line) → arrives **Busan Station**
- Book ahead on the **KorailTalk** app or Trip.com — popular times sell out
- Choose **"Issued overseas"** at payment; the app handles foreign cards better than the website
- No airport-style check-in — arrive ~15 min early, find your platform, board

*Fares vary by train and date. The KR Pass (foreigners only, bought before arrival) can pay off if you add Gyeongju or more rail legs.

The route



GAZI'S TIP

Book a **window seat on the left** heading south for the best countryside and coastal glimpses. And don't bother flying Seoul–Busan — once you add airport transfers and waiting, the KTX is just as fast and far less hassle, city-centre to city-centre.

The 7-Day Route

Four days in the capital, a bullet train south, two days by the sea, and an easy exit. Here's the shape of the week.

FLEXIBLE BY DESIGN

Got 5 days? Do Days 1–4 plus the KTX day-trip vibe. Got 10? Slot **Gyeongju** (ancient capital) between Seoul and Busan, or add **Jeju Island** after Busan. This spine works at any length.

Land & reach the city

INCHEON (ICN) → CENTRAL SEOUL

Clear immigration, grab a **T-money card + some cash**, then take the AREX train (~₩4,750 all-stop) or a limousine bus to your hotel. Base yourself in **Myeongdong, Jongno or Hongdae** for easy access. Drop bags, freshen up — don't overplan today.

PM

Myeongdong street-food crawl

EAT · SHOP · SKINCARE

Ease in with Korea's most famous food street: **tornado potato, gyeran-ppang (egg bread), hotteok, tteokbokki**. Then hit the giant **Olive Young** flagship to stock up on skincare for a fraction of home prices.

EVE

N Seoul Tower at sunset

NAMSAN · CITY VIEWS

Head up **Namsan** by the scenic cable car (~₩14,000 return) or the park trail. Time it for golden hour: the whole city glitters below, the love-lock fences glow, and it's the perfect 'I'm really here' first night.



GAZI'S TIP

Don't fight the jet lag with caffeine and a packed schedule — lean into an early, easy night. Beating day-one tiredness is what makes day two feel incredible.

ROYAL SEOUL • HANBOK

Start at Korea's grandest palace (₩3,000 — or **free if you wear hanbok**, rentable nearby for ~₩15–25k). Catch the **Royal Guard Changing Ceremony** at 10:00. The throne hall against the mountains is pure postcard.

PM

Bukchon & Insadong

HANOK VILLAGE • TEA & CRAFTS

Wander **Bukchon Hanok Village**'s lanes of traditional houses (it's residential — keep your voice down). Then **Insadong** for tea houses, calligraphy shops and the spiralling **Ssamzigil** craft mall.

EVE

Gwangjang Market

KOREA'S ORIGINAL FOOD MARKET

Dinner at the legendary **Gwangjang Market**: sizzling **bindaetteok** (mung-bean pancakes), **mayak gimbap** ('addictive' mini rolls), and live raw seafood for the brave. Loud, steamy, unforgettable.



GAZI'S TIP

Rent the hanbok first thing in the morning. You get free palace entry, the softest morning light for photos, and you'll beat the afternoon crowds to the prettiest courtyards.

Slow brunch in Yeonnam-dong

CAFÉ SEOUL · 'YEONTRAL PARK'

Sleep in, then brunch in the leafy **Yeonnam-dong** lanes beside Hongdae — Seoul's café game is world-class. Pick a roastery, people-watch, and ease into the day.

PM

Hongdae streets

INDIE SHOPPING · BUSKING

Dive into **Hongdae**: thrift stores, vinyl, quirky boutiques and, on weekends, street performers and dance crews owning the pavement. This is the beating heart of Seoul's youth culture.

EVE

Han River picnic

YEOUIDO OR TTUKSEOM PARK

Grab convenience-store ramyeon, snacks and a drink and sprawl on the riverbank as the bridges light up. Order **fried chicken + beer ('chimaek')** by delivery app right to the park — the most Seoul thing you'll do all week.



GAZI'S TIP

On weekend evenings, time your Han River visit for the **Banpo Bridge Rainbow Fountain** show — jets of coloured water dance off the bridge to music. Free, and genuinely lovely.

OPT A

Gangnam, the modern side

COEX • BONGEUNSA • GAROSU-GIL

Glossy, futuristic Seoul: the cavernous **COEX Mall** and its photogenic **Starfield Library**, the serene **Bongeunsa Temple** across the road, boutique-lined **Garosu-gil**, and K-pop entertainment HQ territory.

OPT B

The DMZ, the divided border

HALF / FULL-DAY GUIDED TOUR

The world's most fortified frontier — and the one experience you can't get anywhere else on earth. **Must be booked in advance** as a guided tour (~₩60–110k); bring your passport. Access to specific zones (like the JSA) varies, so check current conditions when booking.

EVE

Wind down your way

BACK IN THE CITY

If you did the DMZ, you'll be back by late afternoon — recover with Korean BBQ. If you did Gangnam, stay out for rooftop bars or a night market. Either way, rest up: tomorrow you ride the bullet train south.



GAZI'S TIP

First time in Korea? Do the **DMZ**. Gangnam's malls and temples will still be there on your next trip — but standing at the line that splits a nation is something you'll talk about for years.

SEOUL STATION → BUSAN (~2H 15M)

Check out, ride the **KTX** from Seoul Station to Busan (~₩59,800, pre-booked). Drop your bags at a hotel in **Haeundae** (beach) or **Seomyeon** (central nightlife). You'll be by the ocean before lunch.

PM

Haeundae & Blueline Park

BEACH • SKY CAPSULE

Korea's most famous beach. Walk the sand, then ride the pastel **Blueline Park beach train** or the **sky capsule** along the old coastal railway at Cheongsapo — the views over the water are unreal.

EVE

Gwangalli Beach

GWANGAN BRIDGE LIGHT SHOW

Cab to **Gwangalli** for dinner with the illuminated **Gwangang Bridge** as your backdrop. Beachfront bars, fresh seafood, and on many weekends, a drone light show over the bay.



GAZI'S TIP

Busan's air just feels different — slower, saltier, friendlier. Trade Seoul's pace for a long seafood dinner and a walk on the sand. You've earned it.

BUSAN'S PASTEL HILLSIDE

A maze of pastel houses tumbling down a hillside, threaded with murals and art alleys — often called Korea's 'Santorini'. Grab the stamp map at the entrance and lose yourself in the lanes.

PM

Jagalchi & BIFF Square

FISH MARKET • STREET FOOD

Down at the water, **Jagalchi Fish Market** lets you pick your seafood and have it cooked upstairs. Next door, **BIFF Square** is street-food central — don't miss **ssiat hotteok**, Busan's seed-stuffed sweet pancake.

EVE

Haedong Yonggungsa

SEASIDE TEMPLE AT GOLDEN HOUR

Close the day at the rare **Haedong Yonggungsa**, a Buddhist temple perched right on the rocks above the sea — magic in the late light. Or head back to **Seomyeon** for nightlife and Busan's famous **dwaeji-gukbap** (pork soup).



GAZI'S TIP

Gamcheon is built on a steep hill, so take a taxi or bus to the **top** and wander *downhill*. Your knees — and your photos — will be much happier for it.

One last Korean breakfast

CAFÉ + FINAL WANDER

Ease into the morning with a final café stop and a slow walk. Pick up **souvenirs**: roasted gim (seaweed), Korean snacks, a last skincare haul, and gifts for home.

MID

Plan your exit

BUSAN → HOME

Flying internationally from Busan? Use **Gimhae (PUS)** for regional flights. Many long-haul travellers KTX back to Seoul for **Incheon (ICN)** — if so, leave a generous **5–6 hour buffer** for the train plus airport check-in.

GO

Spend down & fly out

T-MONEY + TAX REFUND

Use up your leftover T-money on convenience-store snacks, or refund the balance (minus ₩500) at the airport. Claim any **tax-free shopping refund** at the airport kiosk before security. Then — until next time.



GAZI'S TIP

Already plotting your return? Korea rewards a second trip: **Gyeongju's** ancient tombs, **Jeju's** volcanic coast, and Seoul's endless neighbourhoods are all waiting. This was just the opening chapter.

Korea Food Bucket List

If you eat nothing else, eat these. Twelve dishes that define a trip to Korea — point at the Korean and you're sorted.

Samgyeopsal

Grilled pork belly, wrapped in lettuce — the classic BBQ

치킨

Korean Fried Chicken

Double-fried & glazed. With beer = 'chimaek'

떡볶이

Tteokbokki

Chewy rice cakes in sweet-spicy red sauce

비빔밥

Bibimbap

Rice, veg, egg & gochujang, mixed in a bowl

김치찌개

Kimchi-jjigae

Bubbling kimchi stew — pure comfort

냉면

Naengmyeon

Icy buckwheat noodles, summer's hero

Griddled pancake oozing brown-sugar syrup

GAZI'S TIP

Side dishes (**banchan**) are free and refillable — just ask. And many BBQ and stew spots are built for two-plus; solo travellers, aim for gimbap shops, food courts and markets where one portion is the norm.

Etiquette: Do's & Don'ts

Koreans are warm and forgiving with visitors — but a few small gestures will earn instant goodwill.

Do

- + Give and receive with **two hands** (money, cards, gifts)
- + Let the eldest start eating & pour drinks for others
- + Take your **shoes off** when entering homes & some venues
- + Use both hands or support your forearm when pouring
- + Queue neatly & stand right on escalators
- + Say "감사합니다" (gamsahamnida) generously

Don't

- **Tip** — it's not customary and can cause confusion
- Stick chopsticks **upright** in rice (funeral imagery)
- Blow your nose at the dining table
- Write someone's name in **red** ink
- Be loud on public transport or talk on speakerphone
- Skip the line or push — patience is the norm



GAZI'S TIP

You won't get any of this perfectly right, and that's completely fine — the effort is what counts. A two-handed thank-you and a small bow of the head will take you a very long way.

Survival Korean

English appears in tourist zones, but a handful of phrases unlock warmer service everywhere. Read the romanisation out loud.

GAZI'S TIP

Download **Papago** (not Google Translate) for Korean — its camera mode reads menus and signs instantly, and its phrase translations actually sound natural. It's the single most useful app in your pocket here.

A realistic 7-day estimate per person, excluding international flights. Your mileage varies with season, shopping and how much BBQ you can handle.

*USD figures at an approximate ₩1,350 = \$1 and will shift with exchange rates. Solo travellers pay more per head on accommodation; couples and groups split rooms and bring the average down fast.



Where to save

Eat at markets, food courts and convenience stores · ride transit not taxis · pick free sights (palaces are cheap, parks and markets are free) · travel shoulder season.



Where to splurge

One premium Korean BBQ dinner · the sky capsule in Busan · a guided DMZ tour · a hanbok rental day at the palace. The memories beat the receipts.

Make It Yours

This guide is built to be personal. Two minutes of tweaks turn it into *your* trip plan.



Drop in your photos

The illustrated day panels are designed to stand on their own — but if you'd like real photos, replace any panel with your own shots from unravelkorea.com or your camera roll. Keep them at a 16:6 wide crop for the day headers.



Remix the days

Short on time? Keep Days 1–2 and 5–6. Got longer? Add Gyeongju or Jeju. The chapter order is modular — your trip, your call.
